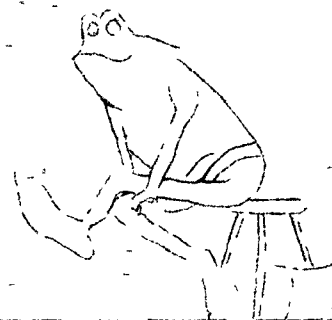

If Ian has had time to run it off, the rules and map for this game will  
 be enclosed with this issue. Lists are now open for Third Age games.

Because of the widely differing strengths of the various Powers in this  
 game, I shall once again be asking each prospective player to submit a list,  
 in order of preference, of the six Powers. The assignments will then be made  
 on the basis of those lists. Prospective players may be interested to know  
 that I have already positioned the Ring for the first game!

This game was originally brought to my attention when it appeared in  
 Michel Liesnard's gazette Les Dossiers de l'Hyène Harra (address p.4). Issues  
 of this zine will contain at least one variant each, in French, of course.  
 The schedule is 'irregular', but appears to be every couple of months. I get  
 it in trade, of course... I've looked right through the latest issue but  
 can't find a subscription rate -- probably it's free?

I translated the rules back into English from Liesnard's impeccable  
 French, and any inadequacies in the translation should be laid at my door.  
 Any queries about the rules, if passed to me, will be forwarded to Brian  
 Libby, the designer; I may also attempt to answer some of them myself...

The new Diplomacy Rulebook has now been published in this country. The BDC  
 has a limited number of copies for sale, price 30p each. I don't know whether  
 these will be sold to non-members, however. Hartley Patterson still has a  
 few copies also.

BDC Part 3....

Shortly after I stencilled Ethel 10, another issue of the Backstabber, dated 10 July, arrived. With it came a letter from Graeme Levin, organiser of the BDC, which is reproduced in full below.

Graeme Levin

Dear John,

I thought that I had clarified the British Diplomacy Club's function clearly to you. However, from what you have said in issue 9 of Ethel the Frog, it appears that you still labour under many misconceptions.

The main objective of the BDC is to recruit large numbers of Diplomacy players who would otherwise never have access to specialist publications such as your own. You hit the nail on the head when you pointed out that it would cost you too much money even to circularise existing BDC members. Consider how much more it has cost me to obtain these members. I had hoped to recoup all advertising costs within a year. However, it appears that the funds spent on advertising, leaflets, postage etc will only be recovered after about two years. How else do you recover the outlay if not by means of the annual subscription and joining fee?

Many Diplomacy enthusiasts have commented that most of the present publications draw their memberships from more or less the same group of people. The BDC provides the opportunity to play against a wide variety of players. Furthermore, because of the ever-increasing number of members, you are quite correct that the BDC will impose a burden on gamesmasters. I can hardly expect GMs to be as philanthropic as yourself, and continue to offer games at a fee which just covers costs. As it is, the £1 game fee plus 20 SSAEs barely leaves a GM with much profit, particularly since all costs are borne by the GM. You cannot simply compare overall costs without comparing the system being used.

Furthermore, once again to clarify the situation, the Backstabber is not (and never has been) intended as a reporting publication. It has never been intended to use the Backstabber for any purpose other than to circularise members with lists of other members and to provide the set of House Rules. Naturally, once the initial costs are covered, perhaps the BDC will be able to provide a more substantial type of magazine. At the moment, members receive game reports direct from the gamesmasters.

I thought that our previous correspondence indicated that you would be prepared to GM subsequent BDC games. If your article was meant to indicate that you are prepared to act as GM for an amount of less than £1 plus 20 SAEs, please let me know. However, I am sure that on the whole the BDC members realise that the additional costs have to be paid simply because without the efforts and expenditures of the BDC they would never have had the opportunity of playing Diplomacy by post, or of meeting other Diplomacy players in their area. Also, the BDC relies very heavily on the time of existing GMs. I am sure that BDC members recognise this and are prepared to pay more per game. Perhaps you would care to let me know if you are prepared to GM BDC games for less than £1 plus 20 SAEs. I have a feeling, however, that your reaction will be that your time is heavily committed. However, at the present BDC rate you would probably be prepared to take on a couple of games. I am not quite sure what more you expect from the BDC. I have stated repeatedly that the main function is to recruit members and to provide members with the opportunity to play games by post, and to meet other members.

You are quite correct when you say that you could easily circularise existing members. I have always been aware that there was this risk in publishing lists of members, but up to now have been confident that others will recognise the cost in recruiting BDC members and will not try to take advantage of the funds and efforts expended by the BDC. I would hate to even contemplate falling into the same trap as our American friends by keeping lists of members secret. I have no intention of doing so.

A very real advantage to BDC members is that standby players can be relatively easily organised. Furthermore, standby GMs can be arranged far more easily than by each independent magazine. I am sure you are sincere when you say that you would like to see the BDC a success. Costwise, we are forced to keep our present form. Furthermore, the BDC has no intention of usurping any of the functions of existing GMs

However, as a member of the BDC you are quite entitled to criticise the organisation, and if you can offer any constructive improvements I will be the first to consider them and to put them into effect. Suggestions have come from many members and I am sure you will find that as the BDC grows and becomes more financially sound, members will receive more from the Club

P S. Please publish my letter in full or not at all. I look forward to your reply, and would greatly appreciate it if you tried to avoid starting any form of conflict or dissension amongst the various Diplomacy groups. The BDC simply wants to recruit members. Given time and co-operation from people such as yourself, I am sure that it will succeed.

(( I still feel that the BDC ought to be offering its members full information on all aspects of the postal Dippy world -- something which, up till now, it is not doing. For instance, the latest Backstabber mentioned variants in passing. I quote. "Some specialist groups offer variants to their members. At this stage, we would like to stick to the basic game. However, once a sufficiently large number of BDC games have started we will publicise and arrange variant games through the variant gamesmasters." All very well, but perhaps some BDC members would be interested in at least seeing some variants? They can even be played face-to-face -- the Cambridge group organised by Andy Davidson have played games of both Abstraction and Diadokhi -- and to deny such people the opportunity to get these variants simply by withholding (even unintentionally) the information as to their whereabouts seems, to me, ignoring the BDC's purposes somewhat.

(( The most important thing the BDC could provide at the moment is an information sheet, I think. It would contain details of the various publications available, with perhaps short reviews, a little information on postal Dippy in general... something on the lines of Hartley Patterson's Niflheim. Perhaps Niflheim itself could be distributed to each member in the next BDC mailing. Hartley is reprinting it shortly.

(( Okay, so I'm arguing from the standpoint of the independent zines. . . tell all the members about us so we'll get lots of readers, etc. etc. But there are advantages with being involved in both organisations. The magazines have given the BDC plenty of publicity among their readers... how about a little publicity for us in return? ))

#### Hartley Patterson

I suspect the basic problem may well be a fannish one. You and I were brought up in SF fandom, the customs and traditions of which are very similar to those of US postal Dippy fandom. Since I took over WF last year, I've been moving into conformity with the US zines I trade with. Postal games in the USA are much more advanced, and, in my opinion, more interesting for the players than those currently running in this country -- the quicker we catch up, the better. I imagine that you are following the same general path.

The BDC is inevitably outside fandom. As far as I know, when it was set up the only postal games Levin had seen were those in Courier -- and Don Turnbull isn't a fan, either. The BDC therefore bears little resemblance to the US Dippy organisations, or to any fannish group.

Your gamecosts calculation omits one vital point -- BDC games have at

least three mailings per game year, 'Winter' being separate. This reduces BDC games to the same level as our own

Ethil -- 24 issues x 5p = £1.20  
 WB -- 24 x 4p, + 25p = £1.21  
 BDC -- 36 issues x 5p = £1.80 !!!

In other words, if you take on a BDC game you will take less income on average than from one of your own games.

My own opinions on what a Dippy organisation should be doing are well-known. I'd like something resembling the US pattern. A magazine with news, articles etc. and various departments performing service functions for the hobby in general, such as an information sheet, adsheets, orphan games, data collecting, and so on. I still hope this will come eventually. A £1 sub for such an organisation might be possible -- for example, the Tolkien Society and the British Fantasy Society are viable at this level. The BFS has a magazine and monthly newsletter, the TS has in effect two magazines and eight mailings per year.

Whether Dippy players want this at present is debatable, of course. Perhaps your readers would care to discuss it? As you may recall, I proposed such discussions in WB before the BDC was sprung on us, and no-one wanted to talk about it...

(( I should have thought the ones who should debate it are really the BDC members.. after all, there are far more of them than there are of us. I suspect most of those already involved with the independent zines don't really like the idea of organisations of any kind connected with the hobby. Perhaps a questionnaire circulated among BDC members in the next BDC mailing might be a good idea. I would be prepared to devise one if necessary....))
